Dear Parents and Carers,

It is hard to believe that half term break is upon us already. It felt as though the last 7 weeks have rattled along at an incredibly fast pace!

Your children have been sensational! They have embodied our Raglan Character Virtues of: KIND, READY, SAFE, RESILIENT, CONFIDNT, and INDEPENDENT.

Over the last two weeks children have been celebrating Black History month across the curriculum. Last Friday I led assembly with a focus on Dr Martin Luther King and celebrated his life, his achievements and the legacy he has left on the entire world with regards to freedoms, peace and civil liberties – all of which we enjoy in England. I paid particular attention to his quote, 'I have a dream that my for children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the colour of their skin but the content of their character.' We honed in on the phrase: 'content of character' and discussed what this meant, and how our own Raglan Character Virtues help to build 'content of character.' My hope is that the children left assembly feeling inspired by the story of Dr King, and the legacies he left us all with.

Children in Year 6 have been painting murals of influential black people and learning about their legacies

In science in Year 5, children will be researching famous black physicists, (past and present), for home learning which is a follow on from learning they have completed about Maggie Aderin-Pocock.

In Year 4 children have been learning about the black author Sulwe by Lupita Nyong'o. This is a story of self-discovery and really made the children think about self-identity.

In Year 3 children have been learning about Mae Jemison who was the first Black female astronaut and her journey.

In Year 2 children have been looking at Florence Price and the styles and influences of other artists such as Little Richard, Bobby McFerrin and Bob Marley.

In Year 1 children have been exploring black inventors, designing spaceships inspired by Mae Jemison, and making African jewellery.

All of Key Stage 1 have been singing traditional African songs such as Oleo and Obwa Si Mi (and played a traditional African 'passing to the best' game to the latter).

Frogs have been creating pieces of art inspired by Kente cloth. It is a Ghanaian textile, made of handwoven cloth, strips of silk and cotton. They have also listened to their very own BHM playlist while working, listening to tunes from the likes of ACM Gospel Choir, Bob Marley, Jimmy Cliff, The Skatalites and Estelle.

The children in Reception have been reading the story Handa's surprise and visited the continent Africa and have been learning about Handa's home country Kenya. We focused on dance as part of our PE lessons for this half-term and learned how to work with others to move to a beat and follow a movement pattern with a partner in time with the music. We learned about the 'Kye Kye Kule', an African call-back song where we had to move our bodies to the different words. As part of Black History Month we dressed up in African clothing, necklaces and head bands to perform.

This week in Sharks, we have been learning about the culture in Brazil and in particular, the annual carnival held in Rio de Janeiro. The children have really enjoyed listening to Brazilian music and looking at the amazing styles of masks that the people of Brazil wear as part of the celebration. The children took inspiration from these to make their own carnival masks and then went on a carnival parade around the school and even into Mr De Freitas' office!



Abass Dodoo comes to Raglan!

This week we had the incredibly talented and international percussionist Abass Dodoo in our school leading Ghanaian inspired Drumming. All children completed a workshop with Abass which was amazing and hugely enjoyed by all. Abass also led an assembly for Key Stage 2. This included him sharing his musical influences, childhood, and his journey through life. Abass has had huge success. He left the children with a key message that he lives his life by and attributes his success to: 'Never Give Up!' This is something that all adults in our school promote with children, so his message should have resonated to all. Apart from demonstrating his amazing percussion talent, Abass accompanied Mrs Osborn (one of our BYMT teachers) as she led Key Stage 2 through Jingle Bell Rock. This was the song of choice because this is one of the Christmas songs we will be recording for our Raglan Christmas Album. In addition to this, Abass managed to have every adult in assembly up dancing to his percussion – which we all enjoyed I have to say! Mrs Ramsdale definitely stole show! She was amazing!



Children will continuing their learning of Black History after half term. Learning about cultural diversity is not restricted in our school to the month of October. Throughout the year children are exposed to learning, assemblies, speakers, resources, experiences and texts that cross a variety of different cultural and faith backgrounds. We are incredibly lucky to have a rich diversity of nations in our school community.

Boys' Football

During this half-term, Raglan boys from across years five and six have proudly represented the football team. The boys have three competitive, group fixtures to play against Harris Orpington, Crofton Juniors and Darrick Wood. Having beaten Orpington in an impressive, dominating 6-0 away win, the boys had given themselves a real chance to push on and win the group. Yesterday, the pressure was on as Raglan faced Crofton, a school much bigger than ours in terms of size. However, I know I speak for every adult who attended when I say that we are beyond proud of the diligence, teamwork, and perseverance the boys showed to secure a much-needed point on what was arguably the toughest pitch Raglan have played on during my time as coach. This now gives us a huge opportunity going into our final group game against Darrick Wood. Win, and we top the group table. Once again, thank you to the parents who helped with travel and supported the children - the success the team is experiencing would not be possible without you. Road Traffic Update

On Thursday morning we had a visit from ClIr Bennet (Portfolio Holder), Ward ClIr's Gupta and Jeffreys, the head of division for council traffic, roads and highways, our travel team leader from Bromley and law enforcement. This was in response to the continued campaign that parents and school are waging to improve the safety for pedestrians in our localised area. We are lobbying for a new speed electronic warning sign to be placed on the S-Bend from Havelock Road to Jaffray Road. We want oncoming traffic to see the speed they are travelling at and then hopefully slow right down. We are lobbying for 20mph speed signs at drop off and collection times of the day, as well as increased parking enforcement. We are making clear to the council that although statistically we look a very safe area for pedestrians; what the data does not show are the daily near misses where a child, adult or both have been perilously close to being hit by a vehicle speeding or driving recklessly. Please do keep sending your pictures of cars parking illegally through to the council. The more you do this on the Bromley parking website the more chance we have of parking enforcement getting out to fine drivers doing this.
