Character Virtue of the Week

Dear Parents and Carers,

Another busy and successful week at Raglan draws to a close. Your children have again provided the staff with many learning highlights for the week. It has again been a pleasure to drop in to phonics teaching in Nursery, EYFS, Sharks and KS1. I have been able to watch and hear adults lower down the school listening to children 1:1, helping them to consolidate sounds, words and read with increasing fluency.

Learning to read is such a critical part of the learning process and helps children to access the full curriculum. The reading skills learnt lower down the school means that accessing the curriculum is made easier. I have seen children in Frogs and across Key Stage 2 this week putting their reading skills to good use, exploring and researching different facts and knowledge in a range of subjects. This knowledge has then been applied to: form predications in Science for example, create writing narratives in different subjects and put together an explanation of events.

I would urge parents to continue to encourage your children to read at every possible moment and help create a real love of reading.

School Dinners

I would like to apologise for the disruption to school dinners this week. We have had one of our ovens break down and we are awaiting the part to be delivered for it to be fixed as well as having had an issue with the haulage company that supplies the food that cancelled its delivery for reasons still unknown to us. As you know there have been some adaptations to the menu this week as a result. We have communicated our frustration to the catering company about the deliveries. Unfortunately both of these factors are beyond my control but I am trying to sort both as soon as possible. I thank you for your patience with this, and apologise for any further disruption if it should happen.

Severe Weather Protocol

As we move towards winter I thought it would be useful to remind you of the protocol when we have extreme weather predicted, such as snowfall. The school would only be closed if:

- We failed to have enough staff make it in to school which meant we did not have correct staff / pupil ratios.
- We had no access to hot water and heating (there was some sort of problem preventing hot water or heating).
- Catering staff were unable to make it in to school which would mean we were unable to provide school meals for pupils.

When extreme weather is predicated we will be informing parents about school remaining open or staying closed via Arbor/the website/Twitter and Instagram. We will aim to do this at latest by 7.30am.

Like last year when we did open on the two days that we had some snow cover, we will do everything we can to remain open – especially if it does snow – because playing out in the snow is great fun!

Anti-Bullying and Agents for Change

On Tuesday the Agents for Change leaders led a terrific assembly with a focus on anti-racism and anti-bullying. As a group the Agents for Change have been prolific in promoting our school character virtues and the protected characteristics. It is not easy for many adults to present in front of a large group of people and publically speak but, our Agents do this with great confidence. The focus on anti-racism was a collective decision made by our Agents. Their presentation included a very impactful short film about inequality which was very thought-provoking. I believe that the power of pupil voice is paramount to the development of a child. One of our key curriculum drivers is communication, or as I like to put it — find your voice! The Agents have found their voice and they are making the very best impact in our school. I am delighted that the Agents have recruited a growing number of other children that wish to be part of the Agents program. The Agents also repeated our TELL, TELL, TELL mantra as the best way to stop bullying in our school. Congratulations to them on a great assembly.

We are incredibly lucky to have had one of our Grandparents (Tony Clark) and his sound technician colleague (Luis Bonilla) complete the recording. I would like to say a massive thank you to our BYMT teachers for all their hard work in helping the children rehearse. Thank you to Mrs Walker, Mrs Farthers and Mrs Osborn. A special thanks to Mrs Ingrey and Miss Lowe for timetabling, re-timetabling and communicating all the logistics to the staff team.
