

Dear Parents and Carers,

I would firstly like to thank you all for the excellent support you continue to give your children, school, the staff and me as we continue to drive our school forwards and upwards. This year, I believe we have continued to build upon the great successes of last year. We finished last academic year with a very strong Ofsted Inspection, and I believe from that start point the

opportunities we provide for our children, their learning outcomes and the development of them socially and emotionally has strengthened. Your children have flourished across the year and have consistently developed and demonstrated our Raglan Character Virtues: KIND READY SAFE CONFIDENT RESILIENT AND INDEPENDENT.

Year 6 absolutely demonstrated all of our character virtues this week on the annual Isle of Wight Visit. Their behaviour was impeccable. They were the very best of ambassadors for our school. The visit was a massive success and all of the children had a wonderful time. I would like to thank the staff that attended the trip and gave up their family time to facilitate what was a roaring success. Congratulations to the Year 6 children. You were the best of representatives for our school.

Your children are the life and soul of our school. It has been an absolute privilege again to work with your children and be a part of their learning journey. Throughout the year your children have faced an inordinate number of learning challenges that we have set them, and they have responded to these with enthusiasm, vigour and a real sense of ambition to succeed. Even if this means that they have had to try, try and try again to experience the success. I have marvelled at children in Nursery and reception beginning the process of writing through mark making. I have been inspired by Year 1 children learning and mastering their phonics and continuing their reading journeys. It has been fantastic to walk into Year 2, or by them, and hear them joyfully learning and mastering their times tables through contemporary songs – incredible! It has been mesmerising every week visiting our ARPS provision and watching all of the children continue to build their language and learning proficiency. I have been dazzled by the brilliance of art and creativity across Year 3; especially their painting and sketching, and equally impressed by the sporting ability of the whole of Year 4 as a cohort! I can barely wait for Year 4 to be in Year 6 because I believe they will continue to fill the sports trophy cabinet! Year 5 have provided me with an equal number of cherished moments this year but their performances (individual and group) at this years' Strawberry Tea were completely moving! Especially the group Ukulele pieces! At the top of the school, Year 6 have made me the proudest of Head Teachers with the way they have embraced their learning, supported each other, and help me lead our school by being first rate ambassadors. Each and every one of our children deserve every credit for the wonderful year they have had and the massive contributions they have made to our school.

I would like to pay tribute to the staff team for the selfless and tireless efforts they make each and every day for the children. The whole staff team deserve every credit – and then a whole lot more – for having to deliver and implement a robust curriculum, with high expectations and with less resources (including adult support). The whole staff continue to put children first! The level of care, nurture and support they provide your children with is indeed humbling. They advocate for all the children in our school. The staff team make me incredibly proud to lead our school. They are a tremendous group of professionals and the very best of people. I would like to take this opportunity to wish some of our staff farewell and wish them all the very best with their next adventures. I would like to say a massive thank you to Mrs Ramsdale and Mrs McLaughlin who have served your children and our school community wonderfully for several years. Mrs Ramsdale returns to us in the next school year as a Teaching Assistant in Year 4, and who knows – we may still see Mrs McLaughlin back supporting pupils in one of the year groups. I would also like to thank Mrs Walker (BYMT), our music teacher. Mrs Walker has inspired so many children in our school to embrace and love music and song. I would also like to say a massive thank you to Mrs Lewis who retires this year after many, many years of service to our school and education. Mrs Lewis has had an impact on every part of the school during her service with class learning along with sport, PE and music. She is a lady of many talents. We also say farewell to Ms Brotherton. She has been with our school for several years and is much loved. We wish her all the very best for her future endeavours. Sadly we also say farewell to Mrs Da Souza and Mr Cosgrave. Both will begin new adventures next academic year. I would like to thank them both for their incredible commitment and the impact they have made in our school.

Next year we are welcoming Mrs Lucas to our school community. Mrs Lucas will be teaching Monday to Wednesdays in Dolphins Class. Mrs Lucas worked with me in my previous school starting as an Early Career Teacher. Over the time she spent teaching in our previous school she became an incredibly popular teacher with children, parents and staff — acknowledging the level of care and support she gave all of the children. I do hope that you make her feel welcome. I would also like to welcome back Miss Proctor from her maternity leave. Miss Proctor will be teaching Wednesdays to Fridays with Mrs Ingrey in Penguins. It is great to have you back Miss Proctor.

Our work would not be possible without the support and oversight of our governing body. They have been a driving force within our school – even if you do not see them doing this. Our governors now join our Trust Leaders in our school review days which happen each term. These provide them with the opportunities to see not just policy in action but, the implementation of the curriculum and the way this is delivered by the teachers. Our school governors continue to provide strategic challenge and support for school improvement, health and safety, as well as safeguarding, Pupil Premium and SEND. Our governors are also important advocates for our staff – and provide them with support.

In terms of outcomes for pupils this year, we have continued to build upon our position from last year. We have exceeded national averages across all areas that are subject to statutory national assessments. This includes the outcomes for EYFS, Year 1 Phonics, the Year 4 Times tables Check and the Year 6 SATS. I am very happy with our achievements in all of these areas (the data is published through the DfE in September). The improvement in the Year 4 times table check has been particularly impressive and shows the effort and raised expectations we have for learning and mastering these as young as possible. We know that the mastery and rapid recalling of times tables hugely impacted on the Year 6 mental arithmetic test because of the sheer volume of high scores on it. It is essential that parents continue to support this at home. When your child masters all their times tables please then help them master the divisions of these.

In addition to this, our reading scores for our Year 6 SATs were incredibly strong. This is a great vindication of the way we teach phonics in our school, and deliver whole class reading; and the reading program as a whole. What is clear is that children love to read in our school. Reading is so important as it unlocks the whole curriculum and provides access to it. So please over this summer holiday; have your children also READ, READ and READ more. In addition to this, I do hope that all children complete the summer home learning project — especially as it is environment themed (something we are passionate about in our school). We hope to be able to showcase as much of the holiday home learning as possible for Parents Evening in the Autumn.

I would like to congratulate all of the children who were awarded Head Teacher certificates this half term for:

- Being Excellent Role Models at Lunchtime
- Outstanding Behaviour and Commitment for Learning

The children that were successful this half term will be awarded the maximum 20 house points from me for their tremendous efforts. I am delighted that these half termly awards are so difficult to decide upon. This is because so many children could rightfully earn these. What I would say to those children that were not successful this time is to always maintain your high expectations; and try to find ever higher mountains to climb. We do notice you, recognising your amazing efforts and successes! We are proud of not just those who have received the half termly certificates – but proud of every child.

A massive congratulations to the children that recorded 100% attendance for the academic year. This is a monumental achievement given that this year we have experienced a variety of different illnesses. These children will also be awarded the maximum 20 house points from me in recognition of their outstanding resilience and commitment – getting in each day.

Congratulations to Yellow House (Yousafzai) who are the victorious team this Half Term. They amassed an impressive 1987 house points this half term. This is a terrific effort. On Friday 30th August all children in Yellow (Yousafzai) can attend school dressed completely in yellow, partially in yellow or in school uniform wearing a yellow accessory. 
